

Memories

I can clearly remember wash day every Monday. My mother would be up to her elbows in hot soapy water. The washboard was set deep in the tub and she would scrub and rub the clothes against it with all her strength – no washing machines in those days! Beside her stood the large bar of Sunlight soap, the box of Robin starch and the little ball of blue to whiten the clothes. You may ask, why the starch and the blue? This was wrapped in a tiny blue cloth. The starch was used after the final rinse to stiffen the collars of my father's shirts. My job during the summer holidays was to help carry the huge tub of hot soapy water to the back garden to empty it down the drain, but before doing this my mother would add a large amount of Jeyes Fluid to disinfect the drains.

The next stage was the rinsing and putting the clothes through the mangle. What a job! Of course all this work called for endless kettles of boiling water. This was very difficult as during the war years 1939 to 1945, gas was rationed and my mother used every trick in the book to dodge the dreaded glimmer man! The best part was helping my mother to hang the washing on the line. It had to be hung against the breeze for maximum drying. I can still see my mother standing with pride admiring the line of washing blowing in the breeze. When the washing was dried and aired she would start the ironing – a job she hated but did it so well so that we would look like new pins setting off to Sunday Mass.



How my Working Days Changed

Castle Industries changed from being a factory about 2008/2009. The workers had to get alternative work or study. While the new arrangements were being made, I started with the reading and writing programme. Before that I made jigsaws most days. Gradually more classes and projects were introduced to the service users. I became interested in the new allotment project.

A Supervisor called Juliane encouragement me to take an active part in the project. At the beginning Margaret took us out to the site and encouraged us to participate. We were looking at the space we had to work on. When we decided what to plant the real work began. Juliane bought seeds and plants and the growing season began. Later we worked on digging the raised beds. This is one of the gardening terms we use. It means that the soil is enclosed in a space with timber and it is roughly the size of a bed.

We planted some crops in the first year. Cabbage, lettuce, beetroot and radishes were our first plants and were very tasty. The next year we were more adventurous, there were tomatoes, onions, beans, turnips, potatoes and strawberries. There is a polytunnel at the allotments so we can start growing more delicate plants

During that year I attended a general gardening class in Target in Donaghmede. This was about functional gardening and how it should progress. I joined Coolock library and began studying for FETAC Communications Level 3.

The classes were held in Castle Industries and we did maps of the local area and some basic maths. I did recordings of my involvement with the allotment project and an interview, two years later I received a certificate for FETAC Level 3 in Colaiste Dhulaigh. Unfortunately I was unable to attend the event. Later my FETAC Certificate was given to me in Castle Industries.

With Juliane, our supervisor, I took part in Advocacy. We had our grievances about pay cuts put in writing and heard by our local T.D. At the Dublin Institute of Technology in Mountjoy Square, I did a course in Advocacy of Leadership. I was awarded a Certificate at Graduation on 22nd November 2013. My family accompanied me when I received my Certificate. This was much different than working within the factory.

I joined the gym in Parnell GAA club. I do weights and treadmill which I find very interesting and I go swimming once a week. Now I hope to continue with my studies and my exercise programme.

Without the encouragement of the staff of Castle Industries (Julie and Caoimhe) in particular, I would be doing jigsaws and just sitting around all day.
