A Trip to Liverpool

My First Job

My father died 1945. I was only 10 years of age and I was the eldest. When I was 14 I had to go to work to help my mother out. My first two jobs were not very well paid so I only stayed in them for a year or so. The first job I got that I felt I had prospects, was in a saw mills. I was led to believe that I could be a sawyer, (a person who cuts wood) or a woodcutting machinist.

I started to work in the saw mills. There were a lot of men working there and a lot of machines. It was a very noisy place there were no ear muffs then so when I got home after a day's work I could not hear anything. To this day I think I suffer from bad hearing but the money was good and jobs were hard to find so I stayed working there.

I learned a lot about the different types of timber and what it was used for. I was put working with a man named John. He worked the kiln were we dried all the hard woods. It wasn't noisy there and John was very good to work with, I learned a lot from him, I suppose I just settled down working in this part of the mill. When I enquired about an apprenticeship I found out I would lose a lot of money by doing it so I was not prepared to do this, (silly me), I stayed where I was and this was a big mistake. I was getting older and they would not leave two men working the kiln. I was moved back to the mill. I now worked on a conveyer belt at the back of a six cutter machine making floor boards. This machine worked nonstop, it was very hard work. When I was 21 years old there was no room for me so I was let go.

When I was let go from the mill I had to sign on at the labour exchange, It was my first time on the labour and it was a big shock to see so many men looking for work. It was a terrible place. I hoped I was not going to be there for long but I didn't hold out a lot of hope. I was there for about a month when Igot a letter from my old boss to come down to see him. They had a new yard and

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they were going to be importing a lot of timber. They were taking on a gang of temporary labourers to work there so I had a job if I wanted it.

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I started in the new yard. The men who were working with me had worked as temporary labourers for many years and they knew all about carrying and piling timber. It was very hard work but when I got my wages at the end of the week I could not believe what I got, I never had so much money before.

While carrying timber your shoulder would be cut to bits and you went home every day just ready to fall into bed but after a week you got used to it. One of the men taught me how to pile the wood, it was still hard work and a lot better than carrying timber. It was winter and very cold standing on top of a pile of timber but it had to be done.

After working in the yard for about two months, the yard foreman said I was to start working with a checker down on the docks. One of the men I was working with said I was to jump at the chance of getting out of the yard as they were all going to be knocked off soon. This was good advice, a week later they were all let go. This was the way casual workers lived, moving from job to job, maybe that's why they got so well paid and before I left they told me to make sure I got cargo money. When I got my wages I thought Christmas had come early, those men knew all the tricks!!

The following Monday I arrived in Alexandra Basin. I had never been there before. The harbour police had to check me in and told me where to find Patty B. I was told to go down to the Ocean Pier where he was working. When I did find him he was working. After work I found him in a checker's hut and would you believe it he was brewing up a pot of tea! We became friends straight away. Pat was in the docks to check all timber cargo coming in for the company. There were ships bringing in timber from all over the world, a lot of them from Russia with such big cargoes that their decks were under the sea. The big blue funnel ships with part cargoes of hard woods had to be unloaded by the dockers and put into compounds from where it had to be checked and

sorted into sizes and types before being loaded and sent off to the mills and timber yards. I spent almost a year working with Pat on Ocean Pier.

Ocean Pier was a very busy place with cranes unloading ships and dockers moving cargo on trolleys on the dock side. This was the early 50's and there were no containers and no roll on/roll off ferries, the dockers 'were all powerful'!! Pat advised me about a few things while I was working down there, I had to become like the three brass monkeys, hear, see and say nothing and that's just the way it was. I did my job and kept my nose out of everything that did not concern me. In time I was accepted. I soon found I could buy or get many things like boots, clothes, food, drink and many other things. Now it was winter and it was no place for the brass monkey to be, it was freezing! There was a canteen for dock workers, it was run by two women and you could get a lovely mug of hot soup there, just the thing on a cold day.

Remember I said it could be dangerous working in the Basin, well the company rented a small compound in the docks. This was used for holding timber before it could be loaded and sent to the mill. This compound was jammed between a power station on one side and huge petrol tanks on the other side and the Calor Gas Plant on another side. If anything had happened I don't know how we would have got away. As spring arrived it was getting a little warmer. The docks were a lot busier, more ships and more cargo. I began to learn a lot about Pat and his life style, he was only 30 years old, he was not married and he lived on his own. He had worked for the company since he was a boy. Every year he went off on holidays to a different country in Europe, he was a well-travelled man and he had seen quite a lot of Europe. I also found out he had a degree from UCD, at that time this was some achievement, he told me he had been a shop steward and that the union had paid his college fees, how lucky was he! Pat also said he was not going to stay in this job, as soon as his papers were fixed up he would be going to America. Pat suggested that I would be mad to stay in this job and I should go back to school and get a better education. I just didn't listen, I leaned after just how right Pat had been but for now I was working and making a lot of money.

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Summer had arrived and between the sun and the wind you could get a lovely sun tan on Ocean Pier. Along with the many cargo ships there were some visiting naval ships and if we had time we could go aboard. Pat could speak some Spanish so he could talk to some of the crew. They asked if we would like to come aboard but we had a lot of work to do. The ship was going to be there for three days and one evening we went aboard. We got a tour of the ship and Pat made a lot of friends. When we came into work the next morning the ship was gone but I did see her many years later when Nellie, my wife and I were going to Wales on holiday. The captain of the ship we were on announced that if we would like to see something special to come on deck. There she was, under full sail, beautiful and lovely to see. What a memory to have.

After nine months I was back where I had started. I didn't like it but that was how it was. All the men were back. The timber Pat and I had sent to the mill was to be machined into tongued and grooved flooring and we had to take it from the back of the machine and pile it into the shed to dry. It took us about a week to pile the lot and then we were told they were letting us go. So it was back to the labour exchange again, I spent two months there and I never saw Alexandra Basin or worked with timber again. Pat, being a permanent worker was not let go with the rest of us. He did go away to America and I used to write to him every now and then, he got married over there and when I did see him many years later he had a big job in a phone company.

That was one year in my life.
